Where we are

The Lakeland Communities Health Advisory Council serves communities that range from the City of Cold Lake in the east, to a number of rural communities including Athabasca, Bonnyville, Elk Point, Lac La Biche, Redwater, Smoky Lake and St. Paul. Our geographic area covers a range of landscapes, industries, and demographics, including long-established communities.



Accomplishments

- Hosted a municipal leader forum in Smoky Lake and in Bonnyville. We informed participants
 about our Council and AHS North Zone leaders shared priorities about the Health Plan and
 Business Plan. Municipal leaders posed questions on health topics in their communities.
- Council has learned the importance of better understanding Indigenous health needs by connecting with local Indigenous communities to build relationships and improve communication, and by recruiting Indigenous members to Council.
- Partnered with AHS to host a <u>Community Conversation</u> in Smoky Lake. Stakeholders engaged in discussion about health care successes, challenges and opportunities for future partnerships.

Our role and objectives

Everything we do is about improving the health and wellness of Albertans, no matter what part of the province they live in. We:

- Are a group of volunteers focused on listening to your thoughts and ideas on health services to help AHS enhance care locally and province wide.
- Develop partnerships between the province's diverse communities and AHS.
- Provide feedback about what is working well within the health care system and suggest areas for improvement.
- Promote opportunities for members of our local communities to get engaged.

There are a number of opportunities to participate:

- Attend an upcoming council meeting to hear feedback, offer comments, and ask questions.
- Make a presentation at our Council meeting on a health area of interest or concern to you.
- Bring your community's voice forward to provide input on local and regional health.
- Volunteer your time as a Council member. Recruitment is ongoing throughout the year until a Council is at maximum membership. Members are appointed for a three-year term.
